VA VACCINATIONS

VA is providing COVID-19 vaccine to the following groups:

 Veterans living in VA long-term care facilities

Veterans who already receive care at VA and are at high risk from COVID-19 based on VA and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) <u>risk</u> <u>criteria</u>. At many VA health care facilities, this group includes all Veterans who are at least 75 years old. Each facility will determine when Veterans in this group can receive a vaccine. They'll base this decision on vaccine availability, local needs, and the strict vaccine storage and handling requirements of the vaccines.

• Family caregivers who are enrolled in VA's Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC). PCAFC Caregivers are eligible for vaccination when the Veteran they care for becomes eligible. VA will tell the family caregiver if they can get a vaccine when VA invites the Veteran to get one.

VA health care personnel. Vaccinating VA health care personnel helps continue to provide care for Veterans.

As I am writing this, I must say it is one of the coldest periods I have experienced in some time. The weather here in Oklahoma has now been below freezing for 11 days and is not expected to reach the freezing mark until Saturday, 02/20/2021. This area has broken more records for low temperatures and wind chills over the last week than I care to think about. The positive is the beautiful snowfall along with keeping power on and no frozen pipes.



I was reading the American Legion Preamble the other day. I know this is something that I should know by heart, but the truth is I am not Perfect (DON'T LET THAT GET BACK TO MY WIFE). Believe it or not, there is even a version of the Preamble on Legion.org that provides a breakdown of each of the 10 clauses within the Preamble to better understand what we as Legionnaires are reading and have signed up for. I would challenge each of you to go to <u>Microsoft Word - THE AMERICAN LEGION PREAMBLE.DOCX</u> and read the pre-amble along with the meaning for each of the 10 clauses.

Yes, I am aware that we recite the preamble monthly during the meeting, but It is so quite easy to take for granted words that we become familiar with.

Now Let us look at something a little differently. Years ago, when I was a children's director at my church I was trying to come up with a short lesson for a very brief children's moment within the main service. So, I stood up in front of the congregation with the children a towel in one hand, an egg in the other, and a small container of water on a little table next to me. I asked for a volunteer from the children, and of course one did, and I laid the towel, which was quite thick, on his outstretched hand.

I then gently set the egg on the towel and began talking about faith. I would pause for dramatic effect to make sure he had not dropped the egg. When I was done with the talk, I asked him for his free hand, and I put one hand under the hand holding the egg and pushed the other hand firmly down on the egg squashing it. There was a loud gasp from the congregation and a complete look of surprise on the boys face to realize the egg was empty.

The point is we get so focused on what we can see or what we hear, we become blinded to what is important. I know this has happened to me as well, I get so laser-focused on a goal that everything else falls away. The biggest goal I have now is to ride my bicycle cross country, slowly, 100 miles and then stay a day where I am at. This would be the ride of a lifetime and would be an incredible way to see and meet people that I would otherwise drive right past doing 55-75 miles an hour (it is driving my wife crazy). We should have faith that God has a plan, and when He is ready, He will reveal it to each of us. Will His plan for me be the same for you? Only He knows, but I would like to believe that when He calls on me, I will be ready. Sometimes faith is like looking at something through the eyes of a child. Children can believe, even if they cannot see. How about us? Can we regain that ability?

His face is on the two-Dollar Bill.

Thomas Jefferson was a very remarkable man who started learning very early in life and never stopped.

At 5, began studying under his cousin's tutor.

At 9, studied Latin, Greek and French.

At 14, studied classical literature and additional lan-

guages.

At 16, entered the College of William and Mary.

Also, could write in Greek with one hand, while writing

the same in Latin with the other.

At 19, studied Law for 5 years starting under George Wythe.

At 23, started his own law practice.

At 25, was elected to the Virginia House of Burgesses.

At 31, wrote the widely circulated "Summary View of the Rights of British America," and retired from his law practice.

At 32, was a delegate to the Second Continental Congress.

At 33, wrote the Declaration of Independence.

At 33, took three years to revise Virginia's legal code and wrote a Public Education bill and a statute for Religious Freedom.

At 36, was elected the second Governor of Virginia, succeeding Patrick Henry.

At 40, served in Congress for two years.

At 41, was the American minister to France and negotiated commercial treaties with European nations along with Ben Franklin and John Adams.

At 46, served as the first Secretary of State under George Washington.

At 53, served as Vice President and was elected President of the American Philosophical Society.

At 55, drafted the Kentucky Resolutions and became the active head of the Republican Party.

At 57, was elected the third president of the United States.

At 60, obtained the Louisiana Purchase, doubling the nation's size.

At 61, was elected to a second term as President.

At 65, retired to Monticello.

At 80, helped President Monroe shape the Monroe Doctrine.

At 81, almost single-handedly, created the University of Virginia and served as its' first president. At 83, died on the 50th Anniversary of the Signing of the Declaration of Independence, along with John Adams.

The U.S. Senate confirmed <u>VA Secretary nominee Denis McDonough</u> Monday, February 8th, and he was sworn in Tuesday, February 9th as the eleventh VA Secretary.

STIMULUS CHECKS

Military.com writes that many individuals received stimulus checks in 2020 and early 2021.

These payments were based on the individual's or couple's 2018 or 2019 tax returns.

In some cases, the taxpayers' income changed in 2020, making them eligible for a stimulus payment.

Some individuals may have also had a baby or adopted a child during the year, which may make them eligible for an additional payment.

If your situation changed, you may be able to request a stimulus payment when you file your taxes this year.

Your <u>tax software program</u> or a tax professional should guide you through the process.

And there is some good news: If your income situation changed and you earned too much to qualify for the stimulus payment, the IRS will not claw back that money if you have already received it.
