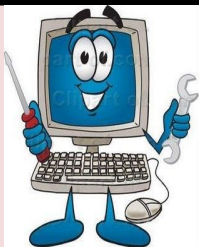

RECRUITMENT

As of January 31, there were close to 1.4 million people serving in the U.S. armed forces, according to the latest numbers from the Defense Manpower Data Center, a body of the Department of Defense. That means that **0.4 percent** of the American population is active military personnel.

Our volunteer defense forces could use your help in recruiting qualified personnel to serve our nation.

Look about and see who you might influence to join one of the Services. Do you remember when there was something called, The Draft?

DEPLOYED AID

The American Legion recognizes that families of deployed and activated military personnel face special difficulties and hardships.

With the help of the Family Support Network, these families do not have to shoulder this burden alone.

Families can request assistance from local American Legion Family members by calling the toll-free number or filling out an online application.

The contact information of the veteran's family member and the reason for the FSN request is collected.

The request is referred to the local American Legion department.

The department refers the call to a local hometown post.

The local post contacts the family and provides the assistance, if resources are available, or refers the family to other local agencies.

In case of financial need, the post provides the necessary funds or assists the family in applying for Temporary Financial Assistance, if minor children are in the home.

YOUR OLD UNIFORM

TECH SUPPORT

We know how to short-circuit calls for tech or other support: ask for representative or agent.

While waiting on the line for tech support, you might try going to the firm's Web page to see if there is a CHAT option.

Sometimes, the chat sessions can expedite your concern; sometimes it cannot, either way, it may help pass the time waiting for tech support.

My wife and others have difficulty understanding some heavily-accented tech folks, so the CHAT option can possibly save some exasperation and frustration.

While on the Web site, there might be a link for self-help tech support and if it works, you could be on your way without waiting for an answer from tech support personnel. You can also request a person who speaks without the accent.

If you find the technician does not understand or is unable to help, ask to escalate the problem. You may have to ask more than once.

One last resort is to call back at a later time, sort of like getting a second opinion, but maybe better help.

Remember, you can catch more flies with honey than with vinegar...but not always!

MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day began as an event to honor Union soldiers who had died during the American Civil War. It was inspired by the way people in our Southern states honored their dead. After World War I, it was expanded to include all men and women who died in any war or any military action.

Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. The present name for this day did not come into use until after World War II. Decoration Day, and then Memorial Day, used to be held on May 30, regardless of the day of the week on which it fell. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends.

That meant that that, from 1971, **Memorial Day holiday has been officially observed on the last Monday in May.**

FREE ID CARD

The Department of Veterans Affairs is offering veterans a [free ID card](#) which can be used to prove your veteran status when needed at businesses and other locations.

The [free ID card](#), which originally rolled-out in late November, was ordered by Congress in 2015 as a way to give veterans proof of service at businesses without carrying a copy of their DD-214 forms. It is available for all honorably discharged veterans, regardless of era or time in service.

Veterans who are enrolled in the [VA healthcare system](#) already have a VA issued ID card, but that leaves the majority of veterans without any valid proof of service that may be required to get special benefits from private firms.

Getting the card is actually pretty easy, at least as easy as dealing with the VA can be. It takes about 15 minutes to log on to [VETS.GOV](#), create an account, enter your service data, and upload a selfie. The website will let you download and print out a paper copy of the card if you want to.




