It was with a heavy heart that I approached writing this month's Commander's Corner.

My heart ached for the lives of those lost in battle.

My heart ached for the lives lost in unsuccessful surgery.

My heart ached for the lives lost due to ravages of diseases.

But my heart also aches for the lives taken by their owners, the 17 veteran suicides lost (maybe twice as high) per each and every day.

On TV, I watched information provided regarding veteran suicide by the efforts of the

americaswarriorpartnership.org. It made an indelible impression on me.

Our Web site outreaches by publishing the VA Crisis Chat Line: 1-800-273-8255 then press 1 or people can text 838255, the <u>veteranscrisisline.net</u>. We also list the 24/7 CRISIS MENTAL HEALTH LINE 998 resource.

The National Guard members take their lives at a 10% higher rate than active duty personnel.

Reservists take their lives at 45% higher rate than active duty personnel.

Active duty personnel have more resources than do our veterans.

The VA is too overburdened to effectively help at risk veterans

As a sad footnote, 135 individuals in a veteran's life are impacted by the one suicide. Is there some actions you might take to help our veterans?

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Happy Fall finally to all and maybe some cooler weather. Here in Oklahoma, the grass is brown from lack of rain and better than 90 percent of the state is dealing with moderate drought. The weather has been difficult this year, and the area has recorded the 6th hottest year on record for the last 100 years. Even the trees are stressed and as a result there won't be much of a color palate to see with the Fall foliage.

Here is the 10th and final clause of our Preamble. The explanation is quite lengthy and so I will provide snippets and direct you to <u>Legion.org</u> to read the entire breakdown:

TO CONSECRATE AND SANCTIFY OUR COMRADESHIP BY OUR DEVOTION TO MUTUAL HELPFUL-NESS...The last or 10th clause of our Preamble is the most important ideal expressed in our Preamble. It marked a new concept in America--a concept that made The American Legion the greatest force for social betterment in all the history of the United States. Let us be factual and examine this.

When the veterans of World War I came marching home, they found the nation utterly unprepared to care for the combat casualties of the war. The wounded, the shell-shocked and the sick were lodged in poor houses, jails, asylums, or what-have-you.


The American Legion wrote such laws, had them introduced in the Congress, went out over the land to arouse the conscience of the people of America and mobilize support for its legislative aims. It did both with a sacrificial fervor that overcame all obstacles.

When the New Deal Program was being developed, the government planners looked at what The American Legion, through its vast rehabilitation program, had done for the veteran of World War I and they decided to do the same thing for all American people. So out of the rehabilitation brainchild of The American Legion, there came the Social Security System with its retirement benefits and old age assistance programs for all the people. The planners looked at The American Legion program of temporary emergency aid to needy children of veterans and there was born-with the support of Legionnaires-the state and federal program of aid to dependent children.

Last month, I was on a rant, and this month I have been practicing being self-aware, mindfulness, and meditation. As I have let you know, I am on a journey to achieve a Master of Social Work and am now just past the halfway point. This is an incredible journey and requires a great deal of self-reflection and evaluation. I pray daily and even during a drought I look for God's gifts that He puts in my path every day, and I give thanks for every one of those gifts.

My prayer in closing: God, please let us be open to see and know the gifts that you provide to us each day, no matter how small or insignificant. Let us remember to be gracious and thank You for these gifts. Oh God, I ask that You also let us feel Your presence in our lives, especially those who are ill. Comfort them and grant them peace. For this I pray, Amen.

Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola, National Commander of The American Legion

Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola (pronounced Tree-Ola) was elected national commander of the nation's largest veteran service organization on Sept. 1, 2022, in Milwaukee during The American Legion's 103rd national convention. His theme as national commander is "V.E.T.S., Veterans, Education, Teamwork and Sponsor."

A life member of American Legion Post 1682 in Rockland County, N.Y, he served in the U.S. Navy and Navy Reserves from 1969 to 1974. He completed a tour aboard the USS *Nitro*, an auxiliary ammunition ship with the Sixth Fleet. He was honorably discharged as a boatswain's mate third class. He is also a member of Sons of The American Legion Squadron 1682 based on the World War II service of Jim's father.

Jim spent his entire working career in the automotive service industry, where he began as a parts manager at a local Chevrolet dealership and went to serve in many capacities of management. At the time of his retirement in 2017, he was director of service and parts at a New York Metro Mercedes Benz dealership. After a brief time at home, he began an entirely new career as a school bus driver for the Falmouth School District and part-time motor coach operator.

Jim served in many offices at every level of The American Legion. He was elected department (state) commander of New York for 2010-2011, and chaired several national commissions to include the National Security Commission, Legislative Commission, Veterans Employment and Education Commission and the Membership and Post Activity Committee. He was elected national vice commander for 2016-2017.

He married his wife Saveria (pronounced Sa-Vare-ee-ah) in 1973. They have two daughters, Laura and Jeanette; a son-in-law, Michael; and three grandchildren, Alexander, Abigail and Natalia. The Troiolas include three generations of American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary or Sons of The American Legion membership.

Jim currently lives in Maine to be close to a daughter and his grandchildren, while still being within driving distance to the Department of New York.
