THE VIETNAM MEMORIAL WALL

A little history most people will never know. Interesting Veterans Statistics off the Vietnam Memorial Wall.

There are 58,267 names now listed on that polished black wall, including those added in 2010.

The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. It is hard to believe it is 61 years since the first casualty.

The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon, of North Weymouth, Mass. Listed by the U.S. Department of Defense as having been killed on June 8, 1956. His name is listed on the Wall with that of his son, Marine Corps LCpl Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed on Sept. 7, 1965.

There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall.

39,996 on the Wall were just 22 or younger.

8,283 were just 19 years old.

The largest age group, 33,103 were 18 years old.

12 soldiers on the Wall were 17 years old.

5 soldiers on the Wall were 16 years old.

One soldier, PFC Dan Bullock was 15 years old.

997 soldiers were killed on their first day in Vietnam.

1,448 soldiers were killed on their last day in Vietnam.

31 sets of brothers are on the Wall.

Thirty one sets of parents lost two of their sons.

54 soldiers attended Thomas Edison High School in Philadelphia. I wonder why so many from one school

8 Women are on the Wall, Nursing the wounded.

244 soldiers were awarded the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War:

153 of them are on the Wall

Beallsville, Ohio with a population of 475 lost 6 of her sons.

West Virginia had the highest casualty rate per capita in the nation.

There are 711 West Virginians on the Wall.

The Marines of Morenci - They led some of the scrappiest high school football and basketball teams that the little Arizona copper town of Morenci (pop 5,058) had ever known and cheered. They enjoyed roaring beer busts. In quieter moments, they rode horses along the Coronado Trail, stalked deer in the Apache National Forest. And in the patriotic camaraderie typical of Morenci's mining families, the nine graduates of Morenci High enlisted as a group in the Marine Corps. Their service began on Independence Day, 1966. Only 3 returned home.

The Buddies of Midvale - LeRoy Tafoya, Jimmy Martinez, Tom Gonzales were all boyhood friends and lived on three consecutive streets in Midvale, Utah on Fifth, Sixth and Seventh avenues. They lived only a few yards apart. They played ball at the adjacent sandlot ball field. And they all went to Vietnam. In a span of 16 dark days in late 1967, all three would be killed. LeRoy was killed on Wednesday, Nov. 22, the fourth anniversary of John F. Kennedy's assassination. Jimmy died less than 24 hours later on Thanksgiving Day. Tom was shot dead assaulting the enemy on Dec. 7, Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day.

The most casualty deaths for a single day was on January 31, 1968 ~ 245 deaths.

The most casualty deaths for a single month was May 1968 - 2,415 casualties were incurred.

REVISIT OUR GWINNETT DAILY POST INTERVIEW

LAWRENCEVILLE — Traditionally, the American Legion post is a physical place — a spot where war veterans young and old can gather to have a beer, shoot the bull, maybe play some bingo. It's a place steeped in tradition, and one perfectly comfortable doing everything the old way, from snail mail to ledger cards. ePost 2100? They're changing that.

One of just a few American Legion "cyber posts," ePost 2100 is led by Lawrenceville resident Ed McMillan — and it functions entirely online.

"We have the advantage of just getting (the members) all together, no matter where they are," McMillan said.

Tuesday marked 95 years since Congress presented the American Legion with its federal charter and, thanks to a proclamation by Gov. Nathan Deal, was the occasion was celebrated as "The American Legion Day" in Georgia. The organization serves roughly 2.4 million veterans with 14,000 posts across the globe.

Seventy-three of those members are served by ePost 2100, which is believed to be one of just four cyber posts worldwide. Though most are from Georgia and the metro Atlanta area, members currently reside in California, Florida and Paris, France.

Dreamed up by the late Larry A. Hoff, who the post is named after, the goal is to reach veterans in hospitals or nursing homes, veterans with severe PTSD or other ailments and young veterans with a lot on their plates. They swap emails and hold monthly meetings via a free online video conferencing program called ooVoo.

It's all based out of McMillan's basement, where an office with two desks and three aging-but-perfectly-functional computers are surrounded by personal knickknacks and patriotic paraphernalia.

"There are people that can't go to (traditional) meetings, and people that won't go to meetings," said Ted Richards, the post's adjutant. "We cater to those

people."

Lt. Col. Randi Williams met McMillan in February after taking a job as parish nurse at Duluth United Methodist Church. Within three weeks, the former Air Force flight nurse was a member of ePost 2100. "It's engaging technology in a way that, whether you're young, whether you're disabled, whether you're just trying to get it back together ... it allows you to have a connection that at times is not so socially overwhelming," she said.

Williams said she's been impressed with the post's knack for "getting things done." The American Legion's "four pillars" of service are veterans affairs and rehabilitation; national security; Americanism; and children and youth.

"The ePost is a place where those values are going to be borne out," Williams said. The folks who run ePost 2100 are not computer whizzes, and members need not be either. All they need is a basic understanding of how to access email and occasionally operate the aforementioned video chat program, and both are things the post can help with.

The goal is not to promote computer literacy but to reach vets who may not otherwise be reached.

"Our big advantage," Richards said, "is we can get to you right in your living room. I can talk to you in my shorts and slippers, you can be in your shorts and slippers."

He paused and smiled.

"As long as you don't have a full-length camera."

I ran across this item on the Internet while looking for other American Legion cyber Posts and thought you might have been interested in a bit of our founding history.

AN ATTORNEY'S ADVICE TO AVOID FINANCIAL PAIN

- 1. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. In- But here's what is perhaps most imstead, put 'PHOTO ID REQUIRED.'
- 2. When you are writing checks to pay on your credit card accounts, DO NOT put the complete account number on the 'For' line, Instead. just put the last four numbers. The credit card company knows the rest of the number, and anyone who might be handling your check as it passes through all the check processing channels won't have access to it.
- 3. Put your work phone # on your checks instead of your home phone. If you have a PO Box use that instead of your home address. If you do not have a PO Box, use your work address. Never your SS# printed on your checks. (DUH!) You can add it if it is necessary. But if you have It printed, anyone can get it.
- 4. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Do both sides of each license, credit card, etc. You will know what you had in your wallet and all of the account numbers and phone numbers to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a place. safe

I also carry a photocopy of my passport when I travel either here or abroad. We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed on us in stealing a Name, address, Social Security number, credit cards. In case your luggage is lost, take another list in your carry on bag, especially if you are abroad and need immediate access to those numbers.

Unfortunately, I, an attorney, have first hand knowledge because my wallet was stolen last month. Within a week, the thieves ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card, had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change my driving record information online, more.

But here's some critical information to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know:

- 5. We have been told we should cancel our credit cards immediately. But the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call.. Keep those where you can find them.
- 6. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc.., were stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and this is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

portant of all: (I never even thought to do this.)

7. Call the 3 national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and also call the Social Security fraud line number. I had never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that called to tell me an application for credit was made over the Internet in my name.

The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen, and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

By the time I was advised to do this, almost two weeks after the theft, all the damage had been done. There are records of all the credit checks initiated by the thieves' purchases, none of which I knew about before placing the alert. Since then, no additional damage has been done, and the thieves threw my wallet away this weekend (someone turned it in). It seems to have stopped them dead in their tracks...
